GEORGE WURTS, EDITOR PATERSON DAILY AND WEEKLY PRESS

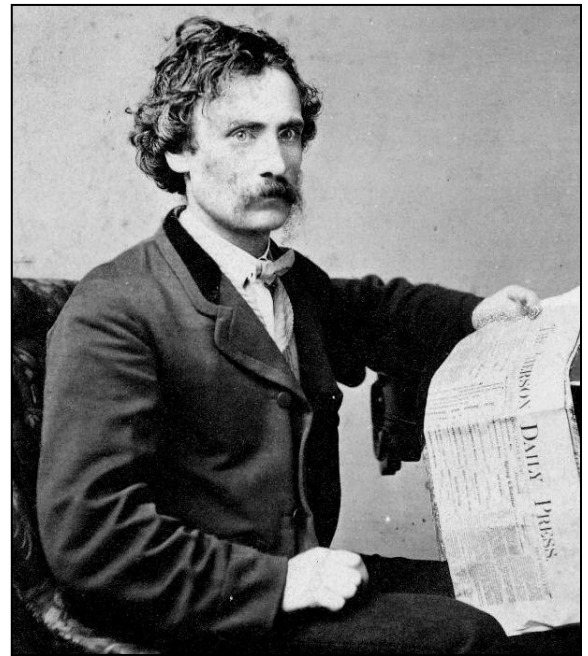
George Wurts was born in Easton, Pennsylvania on September 13, 1829. Always devoted to literature, he engaged in various journalistic endeavors from the early years of the Civil War until he assumed the position of Editor of the *Paterson Daily and Weekly Press* in February, 1865.

Pleasant and congenial, Wurts was a staunch Republican, but it is noted he never allowed partisanship to substitute for sound judgement in his editorial writings. Wurts was assisted in *The Press's* editorial department by his two sons, William L.R. and George Herbert.

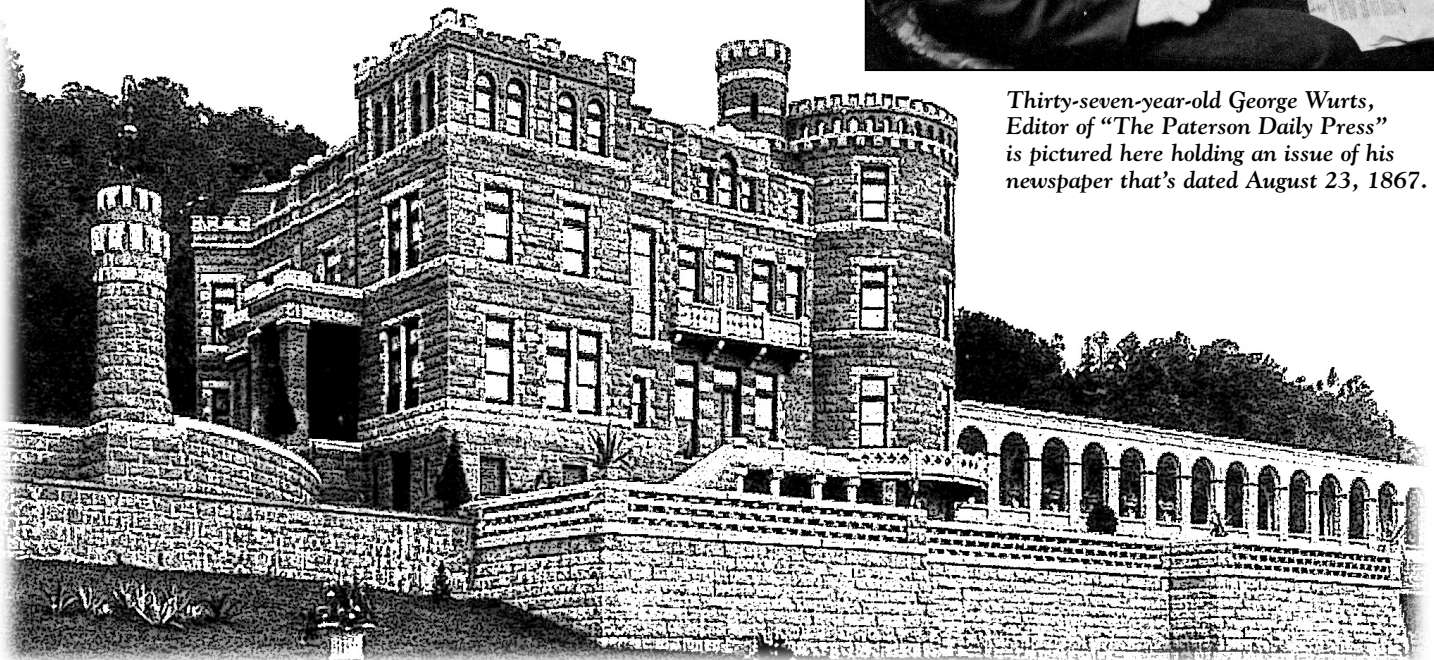
Wurts became president of the New Jersey Editorial Association in 1876, was secretary of the New Jersey Senate during the 1880, 1881, and 1882 sessions, and was a Trustee of the Free Public Library of Paterson. George Wurts died at his home on 149 Hamilton Avenue, Paterson on May 17, 1923. He was 94 years old.

Klett, Chief of Archives of the NJ State Archives was very pleased to announce the posting of the first installment of the phased, further expansion of the New Jersey State Archives' website. This next phase includes posting finding aids and imaged collections linked to the browseable catalog unveiled a few months ago.

From the pages listed above, link to the finding aid for a specific record series. Not all collections have guides, and some finding aids are simple listings of box or reel contents (e.g., county records on microfilm). However, in many cases you will find institutional histories, content notes, and item-level descriptions. As additional finding aids are posted, more and more research will be possible online or planned prior to a trip to the Archives.

Of special note, the postings are two imaged collections: Civil War carte-de-visites (over 400) and Morris Canal Views from 1903. 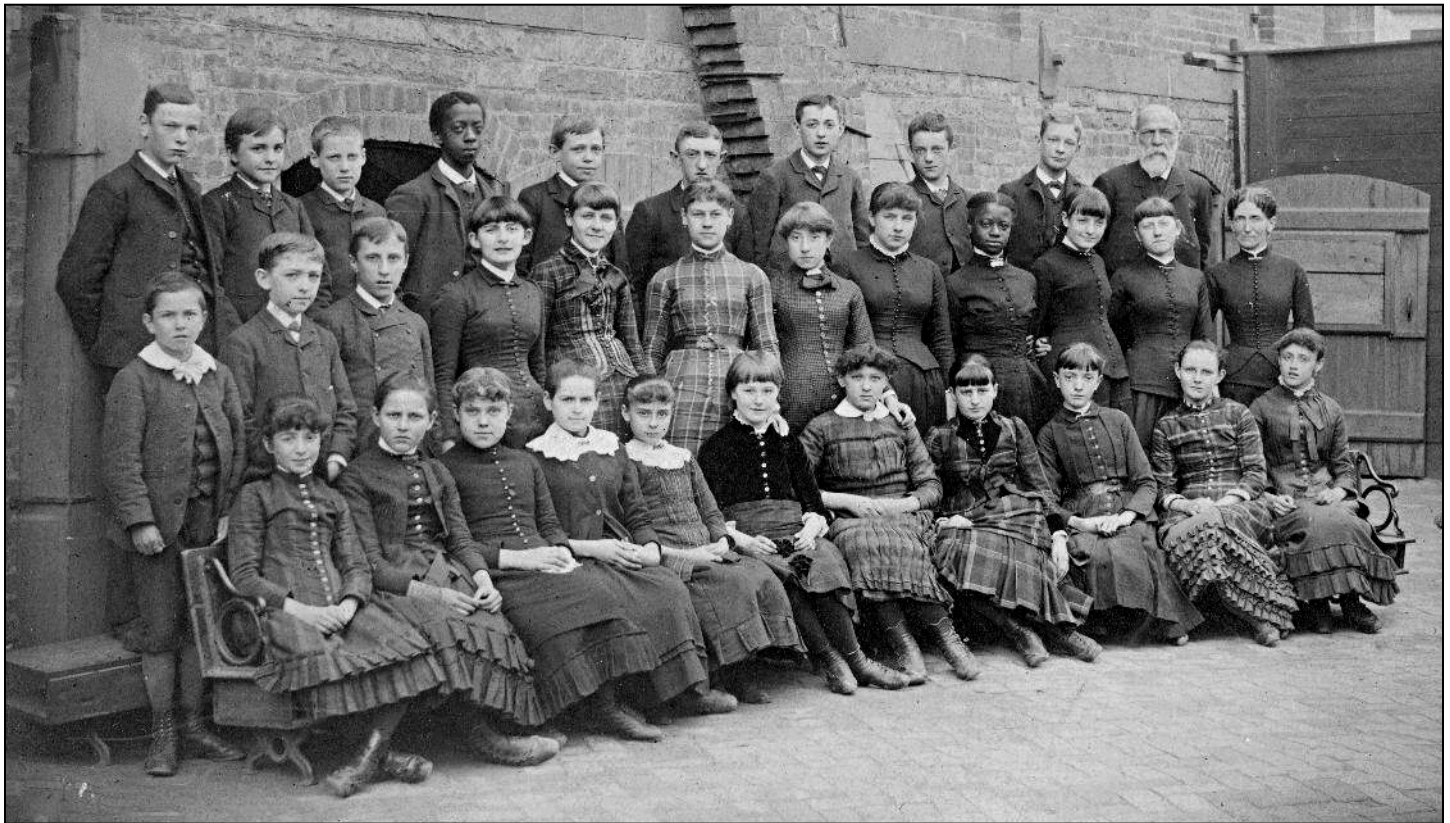
This web version shows holidays, and you can find the history for any date by clicking on that date. The Webmasters have certainly tried to make the calendar error-free.

ABANDONED BUT NOT FORGOTTEN

The Manning Avenue Cemetery

Three centuries have long passed since European settlers ventured to the North Jersey territory located within the Pequannock Patent. These pioneers, suffering through many hardships, built their homes, constructed churches, turned the soil, and extracted minerals from nearby mountains. Soon, these newly arrived people searched for appropriate sites for the burial of their loved ones.

One such burial ground was located high atop a local accessible hill. The unspoiled, tree shaded ground was situated just slightly north of a small but developing community called Bloomingdale.

Local residents and distant settlers located to the north and west of the cemetery, interred family and friends in the gravesite. Members of notable families such as the HILER's, HENNION's, MEAD's, MAYBE's, WESTERVELT's, WRITNOUR's, and VREELAND's, among others, are at eternal rest in the ancient burial ground.

With the passage of time, increased cemetery usage became a concern of interested local citizens. Therefore, in 1867 the Bloomingdale Cemetery Association was formed to manage the expanding site. Plots were then laid out and sold for operating income. The grounds were then regularly maintained and floral plantings set in place to beautify the area.

This satisfactory attention and care continued for many generations due to sincere concern and effort of the Association Trustees and voluntary caretakers.

However, when the last Trustee died in the year 1983, much of the loving and attentive care came to an abrupt end. Because the Cemetery is located outside the bounds of Bloomingdale, the deed, books, and small monetary balance were transferred to a reluctant Borough of Butler, incorporated in the year 1901, long years after the inception of the hilltop cemetery.

Since that transfer of Cemetery responsibility to Butler, the Bloomingdale/Butler Cemetery – also commonly known as the Manning Avenue Cemetery – has witnessed a profound change.

The Cemetery site is no longer situated on a quiet, isolated country hill, rather, the burial ground is now intimately surrounded by single and multiple family dwellings. The original entrance is closed because of local citizens objecting to pedestrian traffic. Entry is now gained on the opposite back side

along Manning Avenue. Dismayed visitors view a critically neglected if not totally abandoned burial ground. The weed-infested grass receives scant attention. Once beautiful geranium ornamentation is grossly overgrown. Trees have fallen or are in the process of destruction. Apparent hillside excavation endangers ancient skeletal remains and stone monuments along the right side of the cemetery. Most appalling, however, is the sight of many, many fallen and purposely toppled gravestones. Vandals have done their work. Local youth claim the Manning Avenue Cemetery as their meeting place.

Although embarrassed by the circumstance of the severely neglected cemetery, Butler officials fend off all critics. The concerns and pleas of local families, historians, genealogists, and residents receive no satisfactory answer for the continued neglect of the property.

New interments are discouraged, possibly for insurance reasons, but the community fathers did allow a recent burial in the neglected cemetery. Gordon Taylor DECKER, a long-long respected resident of Butler, was interred in the Bloomingdale/ Butler Cemetery in May of the year 1999.

One may ask the reason for this singular exception.

Mr. Gordon Taylor Decker, last of the Manning Avenue Cemetery caretakers, did bequeath property to the Borough that has been conservatively valued at \$300,000 dollars.

Shame, says an observer.....

1. BAUMLE: Particularly looking for the death dates of Robert **BAUMLE**, his wife Franziska **THEURING**, and their children Anna Maria and Maria Louise. Robert was born 29 May 1849 in Harpolingen, Baden, Germany and Franziska "Frances" Oliva was born 1 Jun 1853 in Istein, Baden, Germany. They had five children: Anna Maria "Annie" b 28 Oct 1878; Maria Louise b 17 Dec 1879; Maria Sophia b 25 Jan 1881, d May 1968 in Phillipsburg, NJ; Hulda b 1883, d Oct. 1966 in Paterson, NJ; and a 5th child: unknown female, who was born after 1881 and died before 1900. The family emigrated in 1884 from Germany/Switzerland and resided, at least until 1910, in Paterson. Between 1892 and 1893 they lived at 101 Rip Van Winkle Ave, Paterson; in 1900 they resided on Vreeland Ave., Paterson and were still in Paterson in 1910.

2. BLANKERS: Looking for information on aunt Gertrude **BLANKERS**, b. 1920/1921 in Holland. Her father was Gerard J. **BLANKERS**, b. 1888, and her mother was Titia Unknown, b. 1888. Their year of immigration was 1924. Gertrude lived in Paterson, NJ and married a Mr. **MORRISON** in 1954. He owned a machine company, named **MORRISON MACHINE CO.** Their last known address was P.O. BURR: Searching for information on a Lemuel **BURR M.D.** and a Theodore Platt **BURR M.D.** who also went by the name Platt **BURR** and who practiced medicine with Lemuel from 1827 to about 1832. Platt **BURR** was from Watertown, NY and was born Feb. 18, 1802. He graduated from the Berkshire Medical Institute of Mass. in 1827. He married Frances Elizabeth **DANFORTH** of Pittsfield, MA on July 15, 1828 and then they returned to Paterson. Their first child, Ellen Celeste **BURR** was born in Paterson in August 1830. Platt moved to Louisiana about 1832. Lemuel lived for over 50 years in the Passaic and Paterson areas. Trying to find if there is any family connection between the two **BURR**'s. Lemuel may have been born in Connecticut and died in Paterson June 22, 1878. Nothing is known about his family. Only information is his will. 4. GALLO: Looking for help researching Sebastiano **GALLO** who was born in Fagnano Castello, Cosenza, Italy on 23 May 1876. He arrived at Ellis Island Sept. 1900. His destination was Paterson, NJ home of his sister Stella. Stella was born in the same town in Italy about 1874. Stella was married to Fortune **GALLO** (no known relation). Sebastiano lived in Paterson for 4 or 5 years and then moved to Portland, Oregon. Submitter interested in learning about his life in Paterson. Much is known of his life in Oregon. Can anyone help with information on Stella and Fortune. Where did they live? Where did they work? Were there any children? Are there any family members still in the Paterson area? There are four references to them in the Society's website. They were found in Passaic High School graduations and Cedar Lawn Cemetery owners' lists. Is there any member related to, or interested in, researching the **GREENLIE** family? HARRIOT/HARRIOTT: Trying to find missing links to connect ancestor Christopher **HARRIOT** to the family of David **HARRIET** and his wife Helen **CAMPBELL**, who came to New Jersey from Edinburgh, Scotland between 1683-1685. Christopher **HARRIOT** was born in New York or New Jersey about 1825 and his wife, Rachel **WILLIS** was born NJ about 1830. Christopher's family by marriage lived in the Wayne, Pompton, Pompton Plains vicinity. It was characteristic of the family to call members by their middle name, so Christopher might have been William Christopher. He died a young man (before 1870) probably from diabetes which has been a prevalent disease in the family. He left his wife with eight children, all born in New Jersey. The children were: Isaiah (Isaac) b 1848; David William b abt 1850; Christopher b. 1851-1852 (married Unknown **WILLIAMS** and moved to Connecticut); Mary Elsie b 1852 (she married a much older man, Unknown **FRANCISCO**); William Henry b Oct. 14, 1855; Emma b 1856; Edward b abt 1860; George b abt 1866. James had a son, James **INGLIS, Jr.** who was a judge. James Jr. married Ellen **FIELD**, daughter of Samuel B. **FIELD** Many records found confuse the two James. In city directories and in military records (Civil War) there is no distinction between Jr. and Sr. which has become confusing. James Jr. was in business with his father-in-law Samuel **FIELD** in a bookstore on Main St. in Paterson. Submitter hoping someone will know something about this family and provide some information on birth, marriage, children, parents, etc. of James Sr.

Children listed in the 1860 Census are John, b. 1833; Barney (Barnaby, Barnabus) b. abt 1842; James Jr. b. abt 1848; Alfred b. abt 1852; Sidney, b. abt 1856; Elizabeth, b. abt 1848; Whitfield b. abt 1857; and Frank b. abt 1860. The 1850 Census listed a Catherine b. abt 1835 and Ribena (?) b. abt 1838. It seems they all lived in Newfoundland, West Milford, Passaic Co. from at least 1840-1880. Particularly looking for information of James Jr. who married Hannah Lenora (Nora) **TALMAGE** b. abt 1847. Their children were Charles W, Robert, Carra M., Joseph C., Arthur L., Bertha E., Edwin G., and Delos B. Edwin married Lillian **VANDERHOOF** and Delos married Serena May **KIMBLE**. Would also like to find parents of James Sr. or siblings and where they came from. On James Jr. would like to find his obituary and his wife's, as they are the grandparents of submitter.

15. PENNELL: Looking for help on family of Joseph Preston **PENNELL** who was a descendent of Robert **PENNELL**, a Quaker, who came from England to Philadelphia with William Penn. Joseph had an import/export business in New York City, known simply as "**PENNELL**". While on a business trip to Louisville, KY he met and married Mildred Ann **PEAY**. All their children were born in NYC. Just after the Civil War they went back to Kentucky and lived there until about 1885. Their son William Lee **PENNELL** married Florence Ada **SPEER** of Upper Montclair, NJ. They had a colony of summer cottages at Greenwood Lake, NY. William and Florence had a son William Henry Austin **PENNELL** who married Elsie **HARRIOTT**, daughter of William Henry **HARRIOTT** and Genevieve **VAN WINKLE** of Little Falls, NJ in 1914. (see **HARRIOT** query above). William and Florence also had a son Austin who moved to Tallahassee, FL. Several members of William's family are buried in the Pompton Plains Reformed Church Cemetery, Pompton Turnpike, Pompton Plains, NJ.
