## Children Gathered on Steps of Old Mill When Hawthorne Union Sunday School Began

This article is from the Hawthorne Press, August 17, 1933

Old Records of the Hawthorne Union Sunday school, located on the triangle at North Eighth street and Goffle road, reveal some interesting data. The Sunday school was organized in 1860, by a gentleman who was traveling through the vicinity. He called a group of children together on the steps of the building known as Morrow's mill, and brought up the suggestion of a Sunday school so that the children of the vicinity might have the privilege of studying God's Word. At that time, the nearest place for the children to attend a school of that kind was the little frame building on the ground where the Hawthorne Swimming pool is located.

Within a short time, the seed sown by this good man bore fruit, and a little Sunday school was started in the old District school No. 10, located on North Eighth street.

After a short period, an old brick building between the Goffle Brook and Goffle road, used by the Morrors as a drying room for their woolen

blanket manufacturing plant, was given for the use of the Sunday school. The building had no windows, and lamps were used. Within a short time, however, some of the young men of the neighborhood placed windows in the brick building. With the help of their elders, they transformed the interior into a cozy room, and it was a happy day for the group when they first entered the building which was known as the Little Red Brick Sunday School.

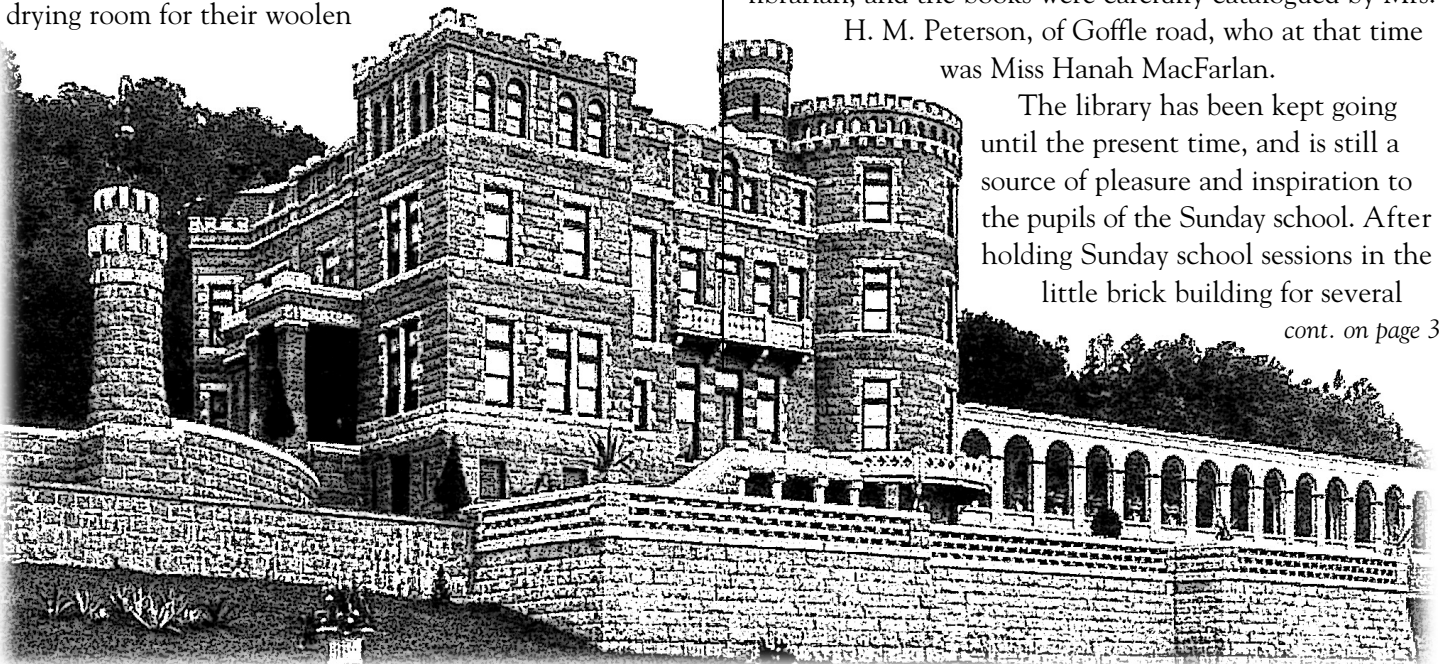
### First Library

Through efforts of a few, some of whom are still living, the first library known to Hawthorne was also established in the building. A fine selection of good books, purchased with the weekly contributions of the scholars, was soon obtained. Some of the older residents of the borough recall with pleasure the delightful hours spent in perusing the books in the little library. Garret Planten was the first librarian, and the books were carefully catalogued by Mrs.

H. M. Peterson, of Goffle road, who at that time was Miss Hanah MacFarlan.

The library has been kept going until the present time, and is still a source of pleasure and inspiration to the pupils of the Sunday school. After holding Sunday school sessions in the little brick building for several

years, it was sold with the corner property to a drying establishment, and it was necessary for the band of worshippers to again seek the old District school for their use.

The little district school soon became too small to house the rapidly growing membership. A strenuous campaign to raise funds for a new building was begun by the late Rueben MacFarlan and Harry De Gray. After some discussion, a building site was selected. The property was the gift of the late William De Gray, who could not give a clear deed, however, because of some unsettled condition of the estate. The property was transferred for Sunday school purposes as long as required, however, and later a clear title was given and the property is now owned by the incorporated body under the name of Hawthorne Union Sunday School.

**Ten Dollar Gifts**

One of the first contributions for the present building was offered by Lawyer Preston Stevenson, who at the time owned and resided on the estate now occupied by Dr. and Mrs. Harold L. Ross, on Goffle Hill road. Many donations ranging from \$1 to \$10 were made, the latter amount being the largest donation by any one person. Fairs and festivals of all kinds were held to raises funds. In 1886 the building became a reality, the work being done by Terhune brothers, carpenters, at a cost of \$773,000.

For 47 years the little building has done duty as a house of religious education and many sterling Christian characters trained as the result of the teachings.

Hawthorne could boast of no improved streets in 1886. Even Goffle road was nothing but a dirt thoroughfare, and North Eighth street was known to be a "regular mud hole" after a rain storm. Access to the Sunday school was a rather trying problem, and on the day of the dedication services of the building, more than one woman was minus her over-shoes when she entered the building. At the time of the

dedication, the trustees of the school were Rev. Henry Dater, Reuben MacFarlan, Garret Planten, Lemuel Van Buskirk, Abram J. Zabriskie, Richard Randall and Francis D. Garrison.

**First Superintendent**

The late William E. Janes was the first superintendent of the Sunday school, serving faithfully for a number of years. Albert Beaks was the second superintendent, and after a short period was followed by Rev. Henry Dater, who previously had charge of the Reformed church of Hyde

Park, N.Y. Many of the members of the distinguished Roosevelt family were regular attendants at this church.

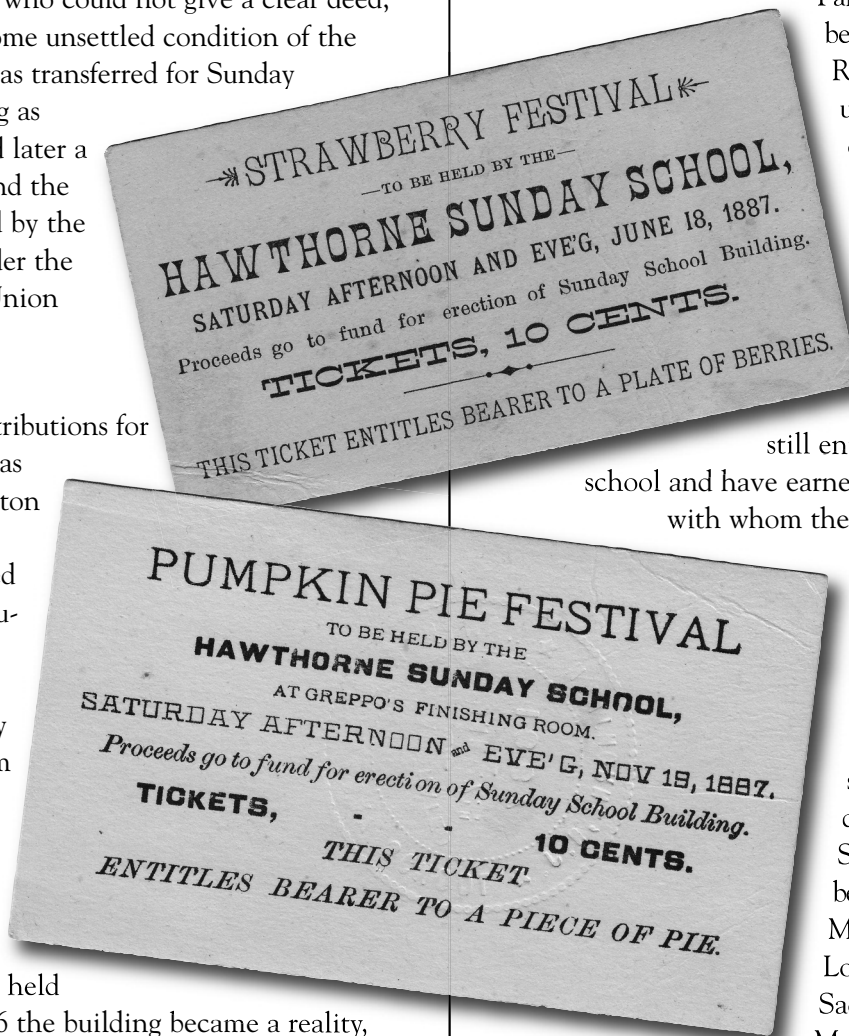
Next in the line of superintendents came Reuben MacFarlan, who served faithfully for about 35 years. The members of the MacFarlan family are

still enthusiastic workers in the school and have earned the deep respect of all with whom they had come in contact.

The present superintendent, Cornelius Bosland, has served for 20 years, and has a record of perfect attendance for the past eight years. A number of splendid teachers have done their duty at the little Sunday school, among them being Miss Rachel Vickerman, Miss Annie Planten, Miss Louise B. Olmstead, Miss Sadie Story, Miss Jessie MacFarlan, Mrs. Josie Warren,

Mrs. P. D. Westervelt and Miss Minnie De Gray. These were followed by the Misses Towell, Crawford, Allen, Writenor, Braen, Kievit, Bosland, Hopper, Peden, Easton, Terhune, Sprague, Lanterman, Miller, Peterson, MacFarlan, Almerni, Carlough and William Parr, Frank Braen, Cornelius Vandenberg and others.

The present staff includes Cornelius Bosland, superintendent, W. MacFarlan, Assistant superintendent, H. B. De Gray, secretary and treasurer; Raymond Lanterman, librarian and Mrs. Masten, pianist.

June 2nd 1887

Pursuant to the public notice posted on the door of the District School House the usual place of meeting of the Hawthorne Union Sunday School.

Citizens of Hawthorne who are Supporters of and contributors to the Sunday School assenbled at the above mentioned place on the evening of the 2nd Day of June 1887 for the purpose of taking the necessary steps for organizing the School under the Laws of the State of New Jersey.

When the Secretary, Mr. Harry DeGray had fully stated the object of the meeting. Mr. Ruben Macfarland was appointed Chairman and Mr. Henry Dater Secretary of the meeting. The Chairman again stated the object of the meeting was to elect Seven Trustees to own and control to property of the Sunday school and to decide upon a corporate name.

The following were then unanimously elected trustees Mesars, Henry Dater, Garret Planten, Lemuel A. Van Buskirk, Abram J. Zabriskie, Richard Randel, Francis D. Garrison, Ruben Macfarland.

# Hinchman's Bathing Beach, Preakness, NJ

As we travel through Passaic County, we may wonder what was the county like many years ago. Early residents would find it difficult to recognize their old farms and homesteads just as we have difficulty imagining what the area was like before cars, traffic, and traffic jams. One location that has changed drastically is Hamburg Turnpike between Hinchman Avenue and Valley Road in Wayne. Ramapo Plaza, a shopping center, is now located at the intersection of these two busy thoroughfares. Most people are unaware that in the 1930s through the 1950s two brothers, Frederick and Theodore Hinchman operated Hinchman's Bathing Beach precisely at this location.

The Hinchman name is well-known in Passaic County. The history of the family in Preakness dates back to 1823 when James Hinchman and his wife Susanna Simonson came to this area from Vernon in Sussex County. James purchased 240 acres of land along Hamburg Turnpike where he farmed and raised his family. James died in 1866. Today this is the property of the North Jersey Country Club. Along the Turnpike close to the entrance to the Country Club are some old stone foundations that are believed to be the remnants of the James Hinchman homestead.

James' son John Simoson Hinchman settled down the hill in the valley along the Singac Brook on Hinchman Avenue. Here John and his family occupied a 2-story brownstone and wood farmhouse; this was the former home John Ackerman. The house was located at the entrance to the Ramapo Plaza on Hinchman Avenue and was taken down in the 1930s.

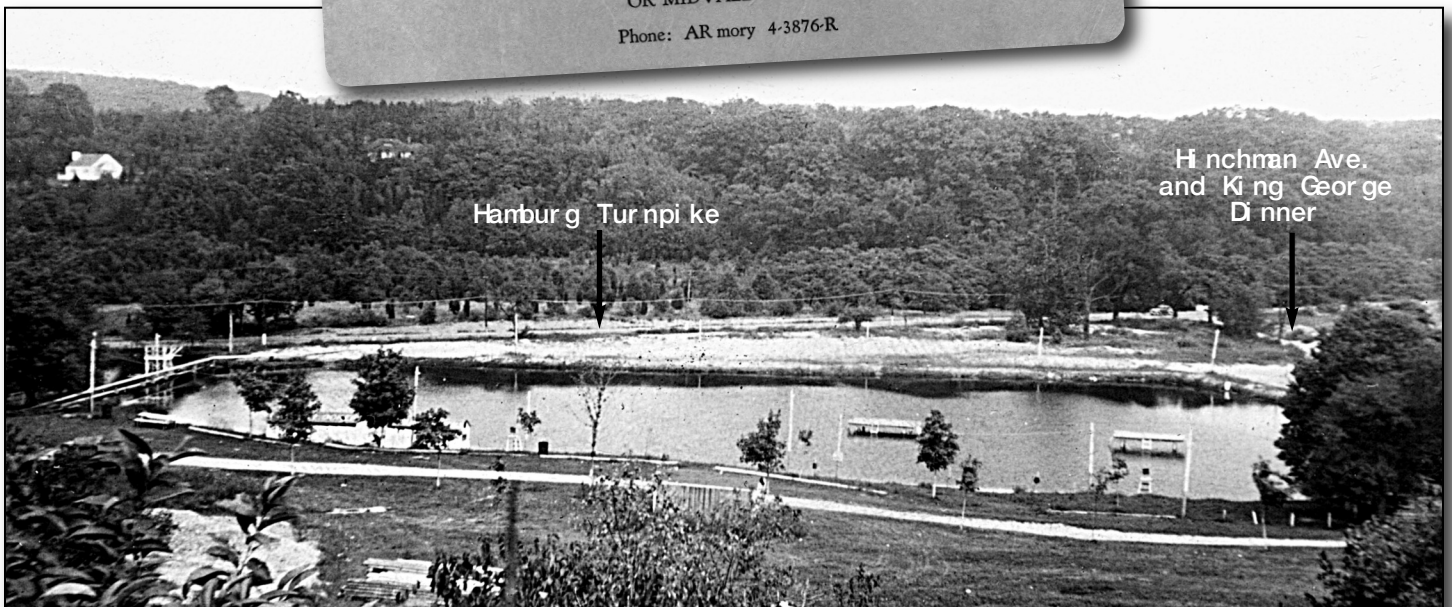
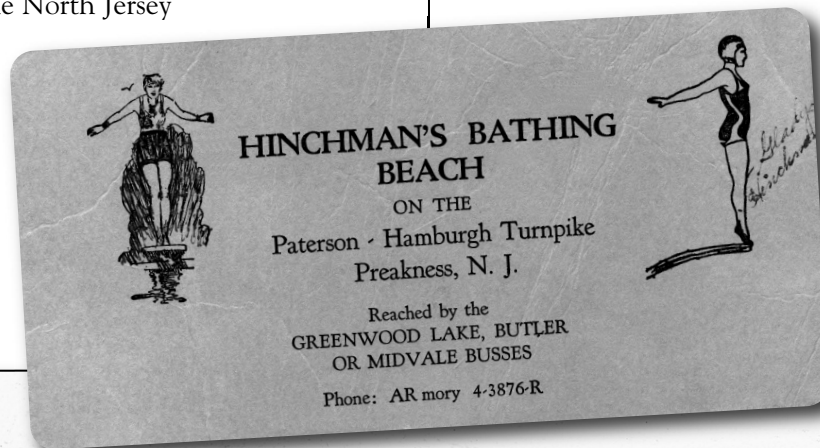
John had two sons: Charles who married Hanna Post and Joseph who married Anna Benson. Charles and Joseph each lived and farmed the land at opposite ends of Hinchman Avenue - Charles was located at the Hamburg Turnpike end and Joseph was at the Ratzer Road end.

Charles had three sons and two daughters. His son John married (1) Harriet Forshay, (2) Cathryn Herberg; son Frederick married Lillian Mueller, and son Theodore married (1) Flora Herberg, sister to Cathryn and (2) Pauline Schnorrbusch, who was Lillian Mueller's step-sister.

Charles' daughters Mary and Charlotte, married two brothers, Charles and A. Grover Simonds.

After they married, the two sisters lived on the opposite side of Hamburg Turnpike in the area of Dave Waks Memorial Park (formerly Barbours Pond Park).

Fred and Theodore both built homes in the 1920s near the present day intersection of Valley Road and Hamburg Turnpike. At that time, Valley Road did not extend to Hamburg Turnpike. It stopped at the parsonage of the Preakness Reformed Church on Ratzer Road.. The brothers also had a dairy and truck farm. Later, during the 1930s through the 1950s, a portion of their property was used for a sand and gravel business.

In the early 1930s the area along Hamburg Turnpike and Hinchman Avenue was excavated; dams were built across the Singac Brook and Hinchman's Bathing Beach was created!

It proved to be a very popular swimming spot for people from the surrounding area. It attracted bathers from as far away as Hoboken and Jersey City.

Today the old farm fields are filled with garden apartments, a shopping center, a car wash, a bank, an office building and a McDonalds fast food restaurant.

The beach had a unique slide featuring toboggan-like sleds with wheels on the undercarriage that rode on a track into the water. It must have been a hard landing, but people were thrilled with the slide. The family had a farm stand where they sold fresh produce grown in their fields along Hinchman Avenue. The hard-working family also sold hot dogs, hamburgers, homemade soups, pies and other goodies to the beach patrons.

Frederick died in 1940 and the beach was then run by his wife Lillian and family and Fred's brother, Theodore and his family. After Theodore's death in 1953, the beach was managed by other family members until the late 1950s when the bathing beach closed. In the 1960s, Valley Road was extended to Hamburg Turnpike.

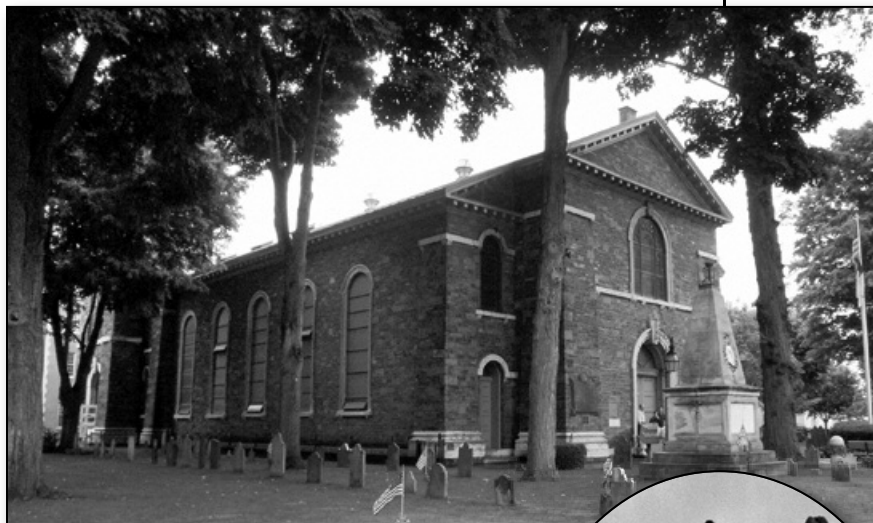

# Historic Kingston, NY Trip

The PCHS Genealogy Club sponsored a very enjoyable trip to historic Kingston, New York on June 12, 2010. After a smooth bus ride from the Castle to Kingston, the first stop was the Historic Old Dutch Church on Wall Street. The church structure is considered by many archi-



tectural authorities to be one of the most beautiful in the country. Now a National Historic Landmark, the church was organized in 1659. The site contains tombstones dating back to 1710, and the grave of New York's first governor, George Clinton. Tradition says that the steeple bell was cast in Amsterdam in 1794 from molten copper and silver items given by families at baptismal rites. The church has a magnificent back-lit stained glass memorial window designed by Louis Comfort Tiffany. It was installed in 1891 behind the pulpit and is breathtaking.

An excellent tour guide from the Friends of Historic Kingston provided an overview of Kingston's history and the history of the Old Dutch Church. Dominie Kenneth Walsh, the pastor of the church and former North Jersey resident, met with our group. Rev. Walsh not only talked about the history of the church, but reflected on his many visits to Lambert Castle, and answered many questions.

We left the church and the driver deftly navigated the bus through the narrow streets of the "Stockade" area of Kingston. The tour guide pointed out some of unique Pre-Revolutionary War houses still standing and in use as functioning homes and offices. The houses were built of

native limestone and mortar and are found no where else in North America.

The next stop was for a delicious lunch at Frank Guido's Little Italy Restaurant. Our cordial bus driver kept us on schedule and we arrived in a timely manner for a relaxing 2-hour boat trip on the Hudson River. The boat leaves from the Rondout Historic District of Kingston. This area, once an independent maritime village, was one of the only three deep-water ports along the Hudson River. As the boat started on its journey, one could not help think about Henry Hudson sailing on this river 400+ years ago.

We had a first hand view of the historic and beautiful shoreline from the decks of the Rip Van Winkle. The narrator on board pointed out historic sites along the river. We sailed past Rondout Lighthouse standing at the entrance to Rondout Harbor since 1837, and the Esopus Meadows Lighthouse, the only lighthouse made of wood. We saw magnificent waterfront estates including Wyndcliff Mansion, at one time one of the most opulent and extravagant homes on the east shore of the Hudson. This mansion, built for Elizabeth

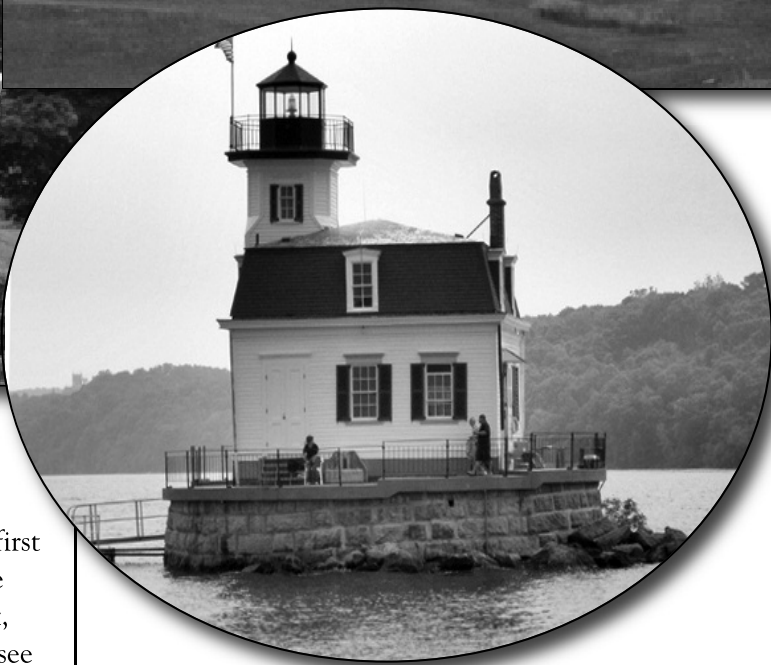
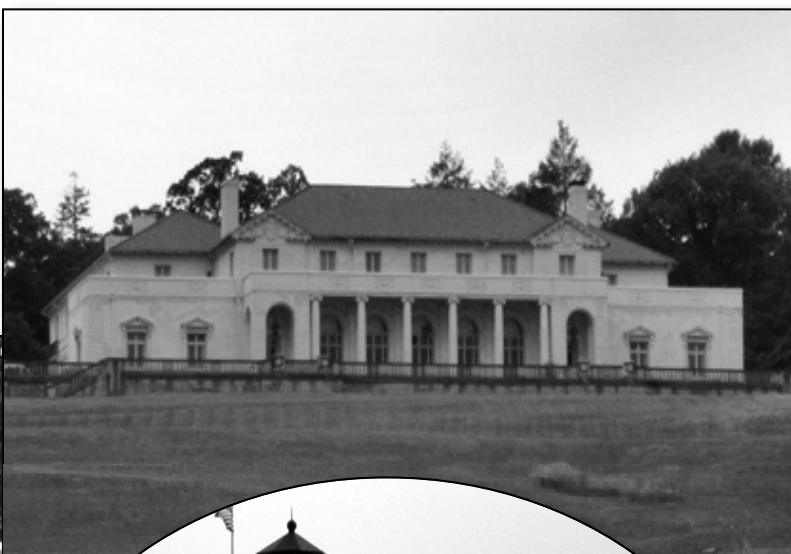


Schermerhorn Jones, was so extraordinary that it inspired the now often-used expression, "Keeping up with the Jones'." Another estate was "Dinsmore", built in 1936 for Mr. and Mrs. Lytell Hull – Mrs. Hull was the former Mrs. Vincent Astor and daughter-in-law of John Jacob Astor –

the wealthiest man in America at the time of his death aboard the Titanic in 1912. We also sailed past the benchmark of Victorian opulence: the Vanderbilt Mansion, long a symbol of American capitalism and the height of the Gilded Age when the “Great and Gracious” made their mark on American society.



We returned to Rondout Landing and boarded the bus for our return trip home. After visiting Kingston and taking the boat ride, it is easy to see why the scenery and beauty of the Hudson River inspired the first group of American landscape artists. Many of us were also inspired.....not necessarily to create works of art, but to return to Kingston. There is so much more to see and learn about this historic area.

## Exploring the 1940 Census

At the April 10th PCHS Genealogy club meeting, Christopher Zarr, Education Specialist for the National Archives in New York City presented a program titled “Exploring the 1940 Census.”

The 1940 census will be made publicly available in April 2012. It was taken on April 1, 1940, during the Great Depression and the New Deal, and on the brink of the U.S. involvement in World War II.

A number of new questions were asked including where people were 5 years before, highest educational grade achieved, and information about wages. This census introduced sampling techniques; one in 20 people were asked additional questions on the census form.

The 1940 census documents Americans during a time of national struggle and will be a great resource for genealogical research.

## Five Founding Families of Old Pompton Township

May 8, 2010 Meeting – PCHS member and author Richard Townsend has researched his family history and local history for many years. In addition to writing a weekly newspaper column, “In Their Footsteps”, he also teaches at Passaic County Community College.

Richard’s presentation at the May 8th meeting titled “Five Founding Families of Old Pompton Township” LYNE, BIEM, VAN WAGONER, and BERTHOLF contained a wealth of genealogical and historical information. Some club members were able to enhance their family’s history as Richard discussed various genealogies, and everyone present learned interesting tidbits of “up-county” history. Rich has promised to return in 2011 to discuss more founding families of “Olde Pompton Township.”
